Procedures for Task One

Look at Task One.

(Allow a <u>15 second</u> pause while students familiarise themselves with the task.)

Listen carefully. You will hear the reading twice.

If you wish, you may start underlining the correct word or phrase as you listen.

'Lords and Ladies' are found between March and April in shady places in valleys and by the walls of gardens and fields. Lords and Ladies are not people but strange looking plants. The tiny flowers are protected by a green leaf which looks like a cap. A smell attracts flies. Flies enter the cap, but when they find no honey to eat, they crawl down the green leaf. For some time the flies are trapped inside the plant and cannot go out. These flowers need insects, because flies carry pollen. When the flies drop some of the pollen on the seeds, the Lords and Ladies open the trap-door and let the prisoners go free. But before the flies go away, the plant gives them a drop of honey as a reward.

If you wish, you may start the exercises as you listen.

On certain days trucks call with very heavy boxes of apples, oranges, butter and other goods while Mr Smith himself comes out and with the strength of a man half his age carries them into his shop.
